

Institutional Building Through the Appointment of an Executive Director

Enabling Strategic Execution and Good Governance

The Executive Director (ED) of the World Association for Sexual Health (WAS) plays a central operational role in advancing the organization's global mission. Serving as the arms and legs of the Officers, the ED is tasked with executing the strategic direction set by WAS leadership.

While deeply embedded in day-to-day operations, the ED functions as an independent contractor with no voting rights. This independence enhances good governance by allowing the ED to provide impartial advice on institutional systems and internal processes, while all final decisions remain with the elected Officers.

Between 2024 and 2025, the ED has overseen the coordination of WAS's key programs and priorities, including preparations for the 27th World Congress, World Sexual

Health Day, financial reporting, membership engagement, fundraising initiatives, and the UNFPA Global Report on Out-of-School Comprehensive Sexuality Education.

The ED also ensures the development and circulation of agendas and minutes for all governance meetings, oversees internal documentation in line with WAS Statutes and Bylaws, and maintains timely, transparent communication with members and partners. This role requires agility, responsiveness, and leadership—often across time zones and in dynamic, high-pressure environments.

The ED may act as an authorized representative of WAS where appropriate, and performance is reviewed through key indicators such as timely delivery, quality of communication, attention to detail, and problem-solving. Through this structure, WAS ensures continuity, accountability, and alignment with its long-term vision.

Executive Director Report

The World Association for Sexual Health (WAS) has made significant strides in 2024, strengthening governance, expanding partnerships, and enhancing operational efficiency.

A key milestone was the successful execution of the in-person Strategy Review workshop with the officers and the Executive Director and in-person, Advisory and Executive Committee meetings in Bologna, Italy in May 2024, which refined strategic priorities and reinforced collaboration.

Two strategic pillars were identified: **Building and Influencing** and the Strategy was revised based on the two strategic pillars with a number of strategic objectives and Key Performance Indicators under each pillar.

WAS became an implementing partner of UNFPA in 2024 and launched the Out-of-School Comprehensive Sexuality Education (OOS CSE) project in partnership with UNFPA, solidifying its global leadership in CSE.

Internal communication systems and infrastructure were improved, while a structured weekly work plan, aligned with key projects, enhanced project management.

The 2025 WAS Congress preparations progressed steadily, with a live website, an active call for abstracts, and key logistical arrangements in place. The annual World Sexual Health Day (WSHD) was a major success, significantly increasing engagement and setting the stage for the 2025 theme: Sexual



Justice: What Can We Do?

Financial sustainability remains a challenge, as for all NGOs, but with enhanced budgeting, membership growth, and new fundraising initiatives and the implementation of Xero accounting software and the recruitment of additional administrative support operations were further streamlined to make the auditing of WAS's financial statements possible. Audited financial statements will put WAS in a better position to qualify for larger funding bids.

WAS continues to expand its influence, the focus remains on building strong partnerships, securing funding opportunities, and advancing Sexual Health and Rights FOR ALL. The progress made in 2024 lays a strong foundation for a successful 2025.

Building Through WAS In-Person Meetings with our EC and AC

One of the most significant milestones for WAS in 2024 was the in-person meetings of the Executive Committee (EC) and Advisory Committee (AC) in Bologna, Italy, on 22 May 2024 - just ahead of the European Federation of Sexology (EFS) Congress.

These back-to-back leadership meetings marked a critical moment in the organizational development of WAS, enabling deeper strategic reflection, transparent governance dialogue, and stronger interpersonal cohesion among our leaders.

The EC meeting focused on reviewing the WAS strategic

plan, conducting an in-depth SWOT analysis, and initiating discussions on institutional expansion through global partnerships and alliance-building.

Topics such as the proposed World Sexual Health Assembly, opportunities for increased collaboration with professional bodies and civil society, and mechanisms for influencing global sexual health discourse were explored.

The meetings also laid the groundwork for strengthening committee structures, enhancing accountability through measurable KPIs, and developing more sustainable fundraising strategies.



Influencing Through The WAS/UNFPA OOS CSE Project

WAS is the implementing partner to the UNFPA Global Status Report on Out of School Comprehensive Sexuality Education, a project lead by Esther Corona.

Preparatory Activities

- Several meetings (irtual and face to face to review of the project with UNFPA counterparts.
- WAS internally, and in consultation with its Sexuality Education Committee(SEC) defined the project structure based on the terms of references' (ToR) and assigned selected staff to the project.
- Bibliography and supportive materials were identified, gathered, and reviewed.
- Once the project officially began, the core professional team was assembled through a call for expressions of interest sent to selected consultants, securing the involvement of recognized experts in the field.

- Prospective members of the ECG were identified in consultation with UNFPA counterparts.




- Online searches have been conducted for both organizational reports and journal articles relating to out-ofschool CSE around the world and specifically for Colombia and Ethiopia to strengthen the case study development.
- To date, nearly 150 resources and articles have been identified, with additional materials being solicited from countries around the world. Resources have been identified including examples from over 20 countries, with additional resources pending from Latin America, Asia and Southeast Asia, and Northern Africa.
- Additional exploration is being carried out to ensure people with disabilities, LGBTQI+ individuals, people engaged in sex work and other marginalized populations are represented in the study.
- Examples of countries and organizations that have integrated technology into their informal CSE efforts are also being included.



First virtual consultation - 16 September 2024

The following objectives of this meeting were successfully achieved:

- To present the purpose, scope, and objectives of Global Status Report on
- Out-of-School (OOS) Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE), and the ECG's role in the process.
- To exchange advances and current challenges of OOS CSE around the world.
- To discuss methodologies and effective practices for the Desk Review and Case Studies (Colombia and Ethiopia).
- To develop a preliminary outline for the Global Status Report.



Workshops and meetings

- To explore in more depth as well as to ensure a multisectoral engagement, a one-day workshop was held in Bogotá, Colombia in collaboration with UNFPA Country office. This workshop was intended to strengthen alliances among OOS CSE stakeholders, contribute to the country's capacity building and obtain information and feedback for the Colombia case study (A full report is available).
- One of the identified challenges has been to obtain information from non-English speaking regions and particularly from Latin America, a large region that usually disseminates information and produces research mainly in Spanish. An opportunity to reach many Spanish-speaker CSE practitioners was at the Congress of the Mexican Federation of Sexuality Education and Sexology - a WAS member association.
- A banner that is used in all the region was designed and flyers printed to support resource collection efforts. There is ongoing work in identifying and reaching out organization and individuals carrying out activities. These materials were used in the Latin American Congress that took place in late November 2024.



Journal Highlights:

Strategic Engagement with the Official Journal of WAS

In August 2024, the President of WAS and the Executive Director held a high-level strategic meeting with representatives from Taylor & Francis and the editorial leadership of the International Journal of Sexual Health, the official journal of WAS. The aim of the meeting was to enhance collaboration, strengthen visibility in underrepresented regions, and align the journal more closely with WAS's strategic priorities.

As part of the outcomes, key short-term actions were agreed upon, including:

- Expanding Global Reach: A new emphasis was placed on increasing visibility, submissions, and readership from the Global
- Membership Access: All WAS members now have free access to the journal when logged into their member accounts.

- World Sexual Health Day Promotion: Select articles aligned with the 2024 WSHD theme of Positive Relationships were made freely available between September and October 2024.
- · Webinar Collaboration: A joint webinar on "How to Get Published" will be recorded to support capacity-building, particularly for earlycareer researchers.
- Editorial Expansion: Recommendations were provided to expand the international diversity of the Editorial Advisory Board.

Discussions also began around a special issue or supplement linked to the 2025 World Sexual Health Day theme (Body Positivity/Neutrality) and the WAS Congress in Brisbane. Taylor & Francis committed to exploring sponsorship opportunities and potential support for a publication prize.

This strengthened partnership reflects WAS's commitment to knowledge dissemination and advancing sexual health scholarship worldwide.

Influencing Through Our Working Committees

The PES Committee continues to advance its work in clinical sexology education and training, aligning with WAS's mission to strengthen professional standards globally.

Established as ad hoc committee in 2021, it focused on training and education in clinical sexology. It now includes representatives from WAS federations from all 6 world regions. and it was proposed to make it a statutory committee of WAS. in 2025.

In 2024, the committee focused on key initiatives, including academic publications, strategic discussions, and preparations for the upcoming WAS 2025 Congress.

The PES Committee convened regularly in 2024, with meetings held on: June 6, August 29, September 23, and November 7, 2024. This includes the WAS General Assembly held on December 12, 2024.

Key Achievements in 2024:

- Data Cleaning: Completed by Osmar Matsui.
- Special Issue on Professional Education in Clinical Sexology:

A special issue of the International Journal of Sexual Health

(IJSH) is in development, with expected publication in late 2025 or early 2026. The editorial team includes Elsa Almâs and Leiszle Lapping Carr. They are also internal reviewers, along with Alain Giami, Osmo Kontula, Denise Medico, and other committee members.

Timeline: Abstracts submitted in October 2024, feedback provided in November 2024, full manuscripts due March 2025, and journal submission planned for May 2025.




Influencing Through Our Declarations


